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# Memoriam

The Chanhassen Historical Society suffered the loss of one of its most cherished founding members in March. Ron Roeser passed away after a brief illness on March 15, 2024 at the age of 90.

Ron was born (at home) in Chanhassen to Leonard and Lorraine (Jorissen) Roeser on July 21, 1933, in a small house on St. Francis Street (the house still stands to this day on what is now Frontier Trail, across from Chapel Hill Academy). The 3rd of eight children, he spent nearly all of his life in this town, seeing it grow from a tiny farming community to the bustling city it is today.

After serving in Korea in the early 1950's he returned to Chanhassen and married the love of his life, Elaine (Schneider) from Victoria. They raised their children here, attending St. Hubert's Church, playing baseball (an early 1950's Redbird!) and coaching Babe Ruth League baseball. He was active in local government, starting Chanhassen's first Summer Recreation Program, and was also a founder of the Chanhassen Civic Theater which performed many plays locally at St. Hubert's School in the 1960's and 70's.

Ron was a prolific writer of stories about his childhood growing up in Chanhassen (one of his stories is featured on page 2 of this issue of the Historian) and the Chanhassen Historical Society is lucky to have these stories in its archives as a glimpse into the lives of those who came before us in our town. His family was his pride and joy, and he liked nothing better than to sit and visit with people who came to visit the Chanhassen History Center during our events.

A well-known and loved icon of Chanhassen, he will be deeply missed by those who knew him.

### A Short Story by Ron Roeser

Sometime in the early spring of the last century, a sailor died.

A boy from the plains of Minnesota - a sailor who had never really sailed.

A rumor had spread that a coffin had recently returned from the War, containing not the body of a soldier, but the leg of a horse.

It was decided by the Village elders that the coffin should be opened.

The local undertaker would open the coffin.

As he removed the screws from the coffin,

he handed the screws to the tall, red-haired girl in the front row.

The cover was removed. The people saw the gaunt sad corpse

of a sailor from the plains of Minnesota -

the sailor who had never sailed.

The undertaker replaced the cover on the coffin.

The procession moved to the church.

The sailor was Martin Roeser.

His friends were Clarence Geiser and Frank Roeser.

The tall red-haired girl who held the screws was my mother,


Lorraine Jorissen Roeser.

I like to visit with the many people I've known who are at rest there, and wonder about those I did not have the privilege of knowing, like John C. Geiser, the architect and builder of the beautiful church on the site.

I'm excited to share that St. Hubert's Parish has obtained a computer program that will allow a mapping of the cemetery and give us better information about the location of the people interned there. We look forward to working with their team on this project. We are also excited about a class in restoring historic grave markers given by one of our curators at Carver County Historical Society this summer.

Summer and fall of 2023 brought more than 300 visitors to the Chanhassen History Center. It is so gratifying to meet with our visitors and answer questions, especially from residents who are visiting the historic district for the first time, and also the many visitors who share stories of past friends and relatives who grew up in this small town.

Last fall our biennial Chanhassen Cemetery Walk brought many visitors to Pioneer Cemetery on Galpin Blvd and the St. Hubert Cemetery. Thank you again to our volunteers, especially those dressed in period costume on that unusually warm day in September!
